Welcome to the 17th Judicial Circuit Judge Pascale Achille! We are delighted to have you on our team. Judge Achille presides in the Family Division.

Governor Ron DeSantis appointed Judge Achille on Dec. 8, 2025 to fill the vacancy created by the August 15 resignation of Judge Gary M. Farmer Jr.

Judge Achille worked as an Assistant State Attorney at the Broward SAO for 12 years where she was a member of the homicide trial until since 2018. She was previously assigned to the sexual battery and criminal units.

Earlier in her career, she spent eight years as a civil attorney handling federal and state matters, drafting appellate briefs and arguing before the Second and Fifth District Court of Appeal.



Welcome Aboard Judge James R. Harris

Newly appointed Judge James R. Harris was sworn into office on March 6th, becoming the newest Circuit Court judge in the Family Court Division. His investiture was April 24th.

Judge Harris was appointed to the bench on Feb. 25 by Governor Ron DeSantis and will preside in the Circuit's Family Division. He fills the vacancy created when Judge Jonathan D. Lott was appointed to the Fourth District Court of Appeal on Oct. 30, 2025.

Previously a senior assistant statewide prosecutor with the Office of the Attorney General, Judge Harris served as a legal advisor to the 22nd Statewide Grand Jury and prosecuted complex cases involving RICO, drug trafficking and organized fraud. His work involved close collaboration with Homeland Security, the DEA, FDLE and local law enforcement agencies.

Fun Fact: Judge Harris and his wife had a side gig working together as wedding photographers. Now his wife works solo.

WELCOME TO THE BENCH

We have a new judge in the South Regional Courthouse!

Introducing County Court Judge Jeremy I. Franker, who was appointed to the bench on Feb. 25 by Governor Ron DeSantis. His investiture will be on June 12.

Judge Franker comes to the 17th Judicial Circuit from the U.S. Department of Justice where he served as Deputy Director of Joint Task Force Vulcan, leading a national prosecution team on foreign terrorist organizations that included Tren de Aragua (TdA) and MS-13.



Judge Franker served in the Department of Justice for seven years and prosecuted complex organized crime and racketeering cases for the Violent Crime and Racketeering Section.

In addition to Florida, Judge Franker has tried federal cases in Alaska, Missouri, and Washington DC.

Previously, Judge Franker worked for seven years as a Statewide Prosecutor for the Florida Attorney General and started his legal career as an Assistant State Attorney in Miami.



Best Wishes in Retirement Judge Carlos S. Rebollo!

After 18 years (and four months) on the bench, Judge Rebollo is finally calling it quits. Three years in dependency. Three years in criminal. And 12 years in juvenile.

His last day in court is April 30. Then he leaves immediately for Fort Myers where he bought a house.

Judge Rebollo was appointed to the bench in 2007 by Governor Charlie Crist, after working 19 years as a prosecutor.

He will miss his devoted staff the most.

“You deal with them everyday and if you have good people around you they make you look better,” he noted. “Fair” and “nice” are how he hopes he will be remembered.

Gone Fishing ...

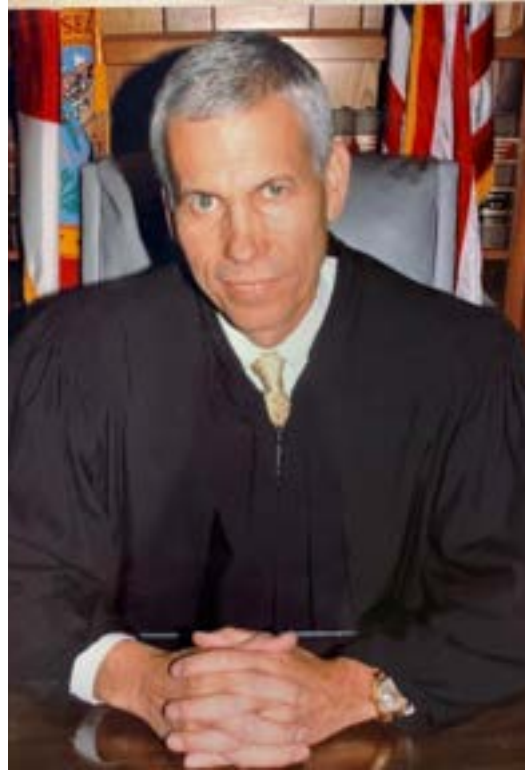
Best Wishes Judge William W. Haury Jr.

General Counsel for the White House Office of National Drug Control Policy (ONDCP) Dario Camacho visited Drug Court after Judge Davis reached out to the White House.

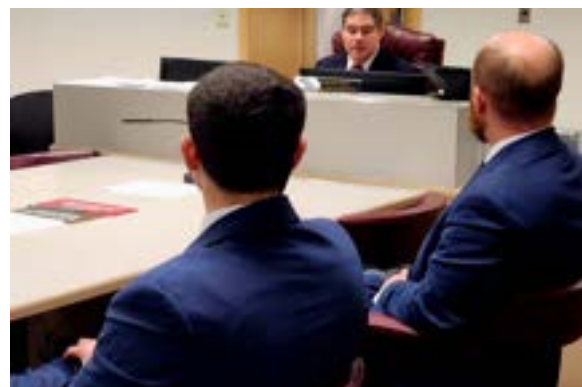

Camacho spoke with Drug Court staff to better understand their work with Drug Court participants and find out why the team has achieved so much success, then posed for pictures.

Drug Court's initiatives mesh with the goals of the ONDCP.

"The Office of National Drug Control Policy strongly believes in empowering local leaders and communities to fight the scourge of illicit drugs that has plagued our nation for far too long," Camacho said.

The new Family Court Services program created to help families improve conflict resolution and assist families faster and more efficiently has already served more than 100 families.



INTRODUCING A NEW PROGRAM TO OFFER HELP

The 17th Judicial Circuit has a new way to help families involved in family litigation:

Introducing Family Court Services (FCS), a program designed to connect individuals in high-conflict family litigation with a wide range of therapeutic services.

The program was created to improve conflict resolution and provide support services to families, with particular sensitivity to the needs of children.

Court Administration personnel assigned to the unit assist litigants by linking families to community agencies or private providers for services such as counseling, parenting classes, substance abuse evaluation and treatment. They also conduct social investigations.

Spearheading the program? Judge Lauren M. Alperstein.

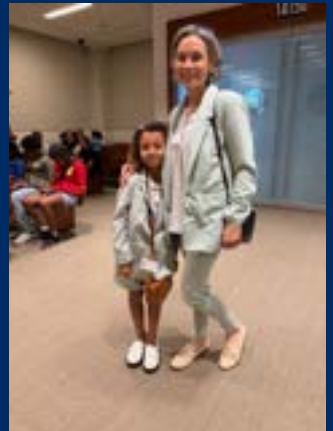

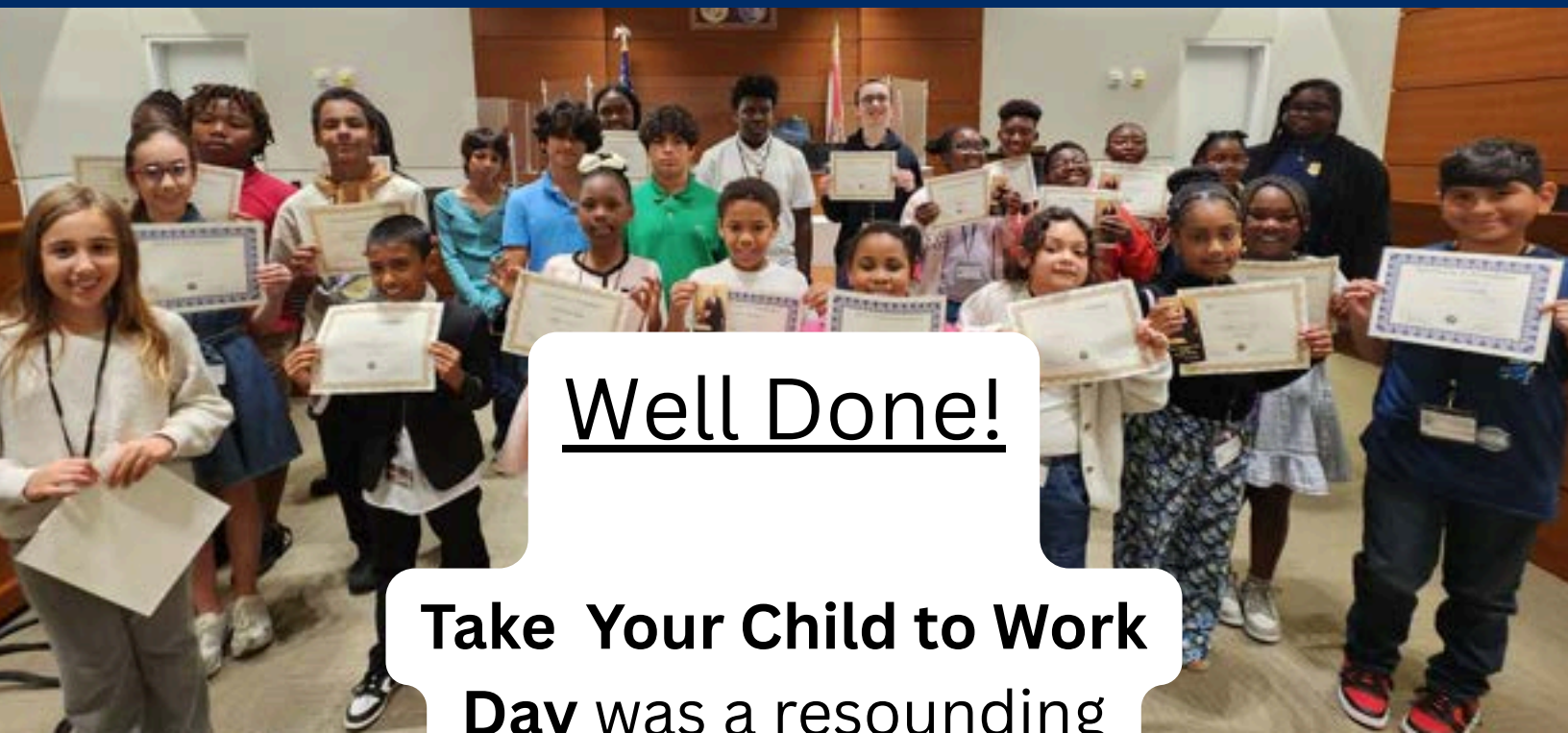

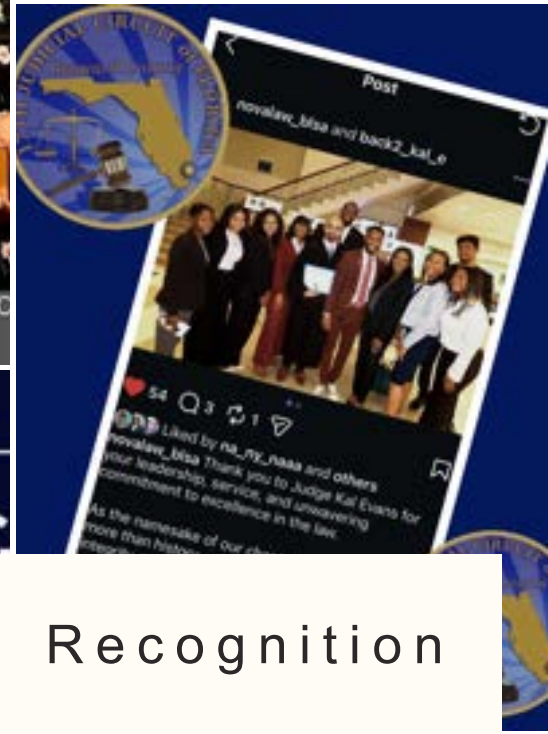
